What is Freemasonry? By W. Bro. Robert V. Lund

Let us consider for a moment, the question: "What is Freemasonry?"

Here are some definitions:

- A brotherhood of men seeking to improve themselves and be of more service to mankind.
- A fraternity whose members seek to improve their morals and support each other.
- An organization of people who believe in brotherhood and helping others.

Each Mason may have another definition.

So, from these various definitions, we can see that Freemasonry is different things to different Masons.

Let us see what some well-known Masonic authors have said.

Manley P. Hall said: "Freemasonry is a creed-less philosophy. Freemasonry is not a material thing: it is a science of the soul; it is not a creed or doctrine but a universal expression of the Divine Wisdom."

He also made the following observations:

"In its highest sense, it is neither historical nor archaeological, but is a divine symbolic language perpetuating, under certain concrete symbols, the sacred mysteries of the ancients."

If you have not done so, you should read Manley P. Hall's book: "The Lost Keys of Freemasonry". At least, read Chapter 1.

Albert Mackey had this to say:

"I contend that the philosophy of Freemasonry is engaged in the contemplation of the divine and human character; of GOD as one eternal, selfexistent being....; of MAN as an immortal being, preparing in the present life for an eternal future

These two doctrines, then, of the unity of God and the immortality of the soul, constitute the philosophy of Freemasonry."

Albert Pike wrote:

"The highest claim of Freemasonry to consideration is that it is philosophical truth, concealed from the masses and taught to the adepts by symbols."

He also wrote: "Freemasonry is the subjugation of the Human that is in man, by the Divine; the conquest of the Appetites and Passions, by the Moral Sense and Reason; a continual effort, struggle, and warfare of the Spiritual against the Material and Sensual."

JSM Ward wrote:

"Freemasonry is something much wider than a school of purely moral instruction, as becomes manifest when we study the second and third degrees, which to a large extent consist of mystical teaching of a more complex and spiritual nature than that usually designated by the term, 'moral instruction'."

JD Buck wrote:

"Masonry deals largely with the ethics and sym-

bolism of the Ancient Mysteries."

"This Ancient Wisdom is the fountain from which Masonry takes its rise."

WL Wilmshurst, one of my favourite Masonic authors, wrote:

"Masonry is a veiled and cryptic expression of the difficult science of spirit life, and the understanding of it calls for special informed guidance on the one hand, and on the other a genuine and earnest desire for knowledge and no small capacity for spiritual perception on the part of those seeking to be instructed."

These men, these Brothers, did not suck those words out of the air. They spent most of their lives reading, researching, and contemplating what they learned regarding the ritual and symbols of Freemasonry. How many of us do that? How many of us have lived up to the charge in the First Degree: of making a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge? These men did and, therefore, we should pay attention to their words and respect their opinions.

Let us now look at the definition of freemasonry, as given in the ritual:

"A beautiful system of morality, veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols".

Let's break down this statement.

A "System of Morality......" - Are the rituals of Masonry there simply for the purpose of teaching morals: Temperance, Prudence, Justice, Charity, and Brotherly Love. Was Masonry instituted to teach these very elementary virtues? In

the examination before Passing, you are asked: "who are fit and proper people to be made Masons?" The answer is: "Just and upright men and strict morals". So, ask yourself if the elaborate rituals of Freemasonry were meant to teach morals to those who are already moral? But the word "morality," in its original, and also in its Masonic, connotation, has a further meaning; it has the same sense as it does when we speak of a "morality-play." A "morality" is a literary or dramatic way of expressing spiritual truth, putting it forward allegorically.

"Veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols..."

- "veiled" means "hidden or covered". "Allegory" means "a story that has a deeper meaning in addition to its surface meaning". Think about that! A symbol is defined as "something used for, or regarded as, representing something else".

Furthermore, think about this:

At your initiation, you were announced at the door of the lodge as "a poor candidate, in a state of darkness, humbly soliciting to be admitted to the mysteries and privileges of Ancient Freemasonry". What are these mysteries? Why is it called Ancient Freemasonry?

Hopefully, you will understand from this that there is more to Freemasonry, its rituals and its symbols, than appears on the surface. Hopefully, you will realize that there is hidden (or esoteric) information that points to concepts important to us all.

Chef's Corner

Coconut Curry Chicken W. Bro. Rob Lund Easy to make simple coconut and tomato based curry. Serves 6.

Reduce heat to medium, and cook for 7 to 10 minutes, or until chicken is no longer pink in cen-

Ingredients

- 2 lbs chicken breasts, boneless, skinless, cut into 1/2-inch chunks
- Salt and pepper
- 1 1/2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- · 2 tablespoons curry powder
- 1/2 onion, thinly sliced
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 can (14 ounce) coconut milk
- 1 can (14.5 ounce) diced tomato, drained
- 1 can (8 ounce) tomato sauce (passata may be used if tomato sauce is not available)
- 3 tablespoons sugar

Method:

- 1. Season the chicken chunks with salt and pepper.
- Mix curry powder and oil. Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat and add the curry oil mixture. Heat curry oil for 1 minute.
- 3. Add garlic and onions and cook for 1 minute.
- 4. Add chicken chunks and toss lightly to coat with the curry oil mixture.



ter and juices run clear.

- Pour coconut milk, diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, and sugar into the pan, and stir to combine. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, approximately 30 to 40 minutes.
- 7. Spiciness can be adjusted by adding chilli powder to the curry powder.
- 8. Serve immediately, over rice. Enjoy!

Architecture Corner by W. Bro. Rob Lund

Architectural features and Glossary (contd.)

Quoins

Large, prominent masonry units outlining windows, doorways, segments, and corners of buildings.

Rafters

The inclined, sloping framing members of a roof, and to which the roof covering is affixed.

Roof Ridge

The horizontal intersection of two roof slopes at the top of a roof.

Roofline

The part of a building that rises above the building's eaves. Rooflines can be highly decorative, with balustrades, pediments, statuary, dormer windows,

cross gables, etc.

Round-arched Window

A window that is fully arched at its top.

Roundel

A small, circular panel or window.

Rubble Brick

Rough-edged brick, often of variegated colors.

Saltbox Roof

A gable roof whose rear slope is longer than its front slope. The rear slope often very nearly meets the ground. Saltbox roofs are common to the architecture of Colonial New England.

The Grand Lodge Committee on Ma-

sonic Education offers interesting Correspondence Courses on Masonic Education throughout this Jurisdiction which is comprised of nineteen different modules.

Any Master Mason may take any module individually for \$10.00 each or they may wish to complete a course of study for a set fee. If a Brother takes an individual module today, and decides to complete a course of study later in time, he will be accredited with the module he has completed prior. In other words, he does not have to pay for or rewrite what he has already completed in the past. There are three courses of study offered by the College of Freemasonry:

- 1. "The Masonic Arts and Sciences" course (eighteen modules).
- The "Past Master's course" (eleven modules)
- The "Worshipful Master course" (eight modules). Any Brother looking to run for the DDGM of heir District or Grand Registrar, the course required by the Book of Constitution, Section 50(b), is the "Past Master's Course". This course is also great for those looking to be a District Secretary.


Heritage Lodge

Esoteric Handbook For The Entered Apprentice Mason


This book is intended to make known, to the newly initiated Mason, those esoteric principles that underlie our amazing Masonic Degree rituals.

It is the first of a series of three books, each dealing with a specific Degree.






