

Chef's Corner

Indian Butter Shrimp

Prep time: 10 mins. Cook time: 20 mins.

Ingredients

 2 pounds large shrimp, peeled and deveined with tails intact

- ½ cup butter
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1½ teaspoons garam masala
- 2 tablespoons tandoori paste
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1¼ cups whipping cream
- 1 teaspoon honey
- ⅓ cup plain yogurt
- 2 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped
- 1 tablespoon sliced almonds
- Cooked rice and lemon wedges to serve

Method:

 In a large, deep skillet, melt the butter over medium heat. Add the garlic, cumin, paprika, and 1 teaspoon of garam masala and cook for 1 to 2 minutes until fragrant. Add the tandoori paste and tomato paste stirring

to incorporate, and cook for another 2 minutes. Stir in the cream and honey, then reduce heat and simmer for 8 to 10 minutes, or until sauce begins to thicken.

- Add the shrimp to the skillet and cook for about 10 minutes at a simmer until the shrimp are pink and cooked through. Remove pan from heat and stir in the yogurt, remaining garam masala, and half of the cilantro.
 Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- Serve over cooked rice and garnish with remaining cilantro, lemon wedges, and slivered almonds.

Architectural features and Glossary (contd.)

Stick-work

A wooden grid of boards overlaid atop an exterior surface. See lattice-work.

Striated Brick

Brickwork made up of rows of bricks of alternating colors, typically red and white.

Stucco

A plaster used as a coating for walls and ceilings, and often used for decoration; it is common to many parts of the world, particularly to the Mediterranean region and to the regions of the United States once colonized by Spain (i.e., Florida and California).

Terrace

An outdoor extension of a building, situated above the ground level, and open to the sky. See patio.

Thatched Roof

A roof covered with straw, which is layered so as to shed rain quickly and effectively.

Tile Roof

A roof covered with tiles that are usually hollow and half-cylindrical in shape, and made out of clay. Tile roofs are common in many parts of the world, including the Mediterranean and the Southwestern United States.

sonic Education offers interesting Correspondence Courses on Masonic Education throughout this Jurisdiction which is comprised of nineteen different modules.

Any Master Mason may take any module individually for \$10.00 each or they may wish to complete a course of study for a set fee. If a Brother takes an individual module today, and decides to complete a course of study later in time, he will be accredited with the module he has completed prior. In other words, he does not have to pay for or rewrite what he has already completed in the past. There are three courses of study offered by the College of Freemasonry:

- "The Masonic Arts and Sciences" course (eighteen modules).
- 2. The "Past Master's course" (eleven modules)
- 3. The "Worshipful Master course" (eight modules). Any Brother looking to run for the DDGM of heir District or Grand Registrar, the course required by the Book of Constitution, Section 50(b), is the "Past Master's Course". This course is also great for those looking to be a District Secretary.



Esoteric Handbook For The Entered Apprentice Mason


This book is intended to make known, to the newly initiated Mason, those esoteric principles that underlie our amazing Masonic Degree rituals.

It is the first of a series of three books, each dealing with a specific Degree.


